	10.15 – 10.45 (30 mins)	First Break
	10.45 – 11.00 (15 mins)	Story: The Bushwalk by Sandra Kendell Science Skills: Where can you find living things in the forest? How would you catch an insect with wings/pincers/camouflage? Collection techniques are explained and demonstrated and the need for safety in the bush is emphasised.
	11.00 – 11.45 (45 mins)	Sensory Forest Adventure: Insect collection and plant observation
	11.45 – 12.15 (30 mins)	Classifying: Sort invertebrates by observable features and record in field booklet
	12.15 – 12.45 (30 mins)	Second Break
	12.45 – 1.15 (30 mins)	Microscope: Viewing insects under the microscope to observe external features Compare similarities and differences between invertebrates Draw and label an insect and an arachnid
	1.15 – 1.30 (15 mins)	Conclusion: Discuss why living and non-living things are important in a forest environment (field booklets).
	1.30 - 1.45 (15 mins)	Teacher-in-Role: Return of the 'Development Manager'. Justify the importance of living things in the forest.
	1.45 -2.15 (30 mins)	Live Animal Display: Experience live animals and discuss their specific observable external features
